

the Summit Circle at SBR. After you take a left, right, and cross two bridges, the grounds start with the Legacy Lodge Plaza that contains a

collection of legacy rocks from extinct lodges. The grounds continue with the National Reflection



Trail that winds its way pass fifteen columns and blazes. Each column is constructed with legacy rocks from active lodges from around the world. At the top of the sixth column is our Mowogo legacy rock.

An iconic gateway welcomes you into the hallowed Summit Circle and presents several unique points of



interest. First, the new Summit Circle is constructed from the fire rings, ashes, perimeter rocks, and 50th anniversary lectern/plaque from the original Treasure Island ceremonial grounds. Second, the triangular, iron Centennial Fire Ring,





presented at the 2015 NOAC, is located at the heart of the Summit Circle with the word "Brotherhood" welcoming you in, which is brightly lit when a fire is within.

Finally, three columns rise both inside and outside the ring commemorating the original three Ordeal tasks. The first task illustrated brotherhood by encircling a large tree by a candidate and an officer of the council fire, which neither could do by themselves. The second task represented service by the scaling of a steep bank by the candidate only being successful with the aid of an officer of the council fire. The final task exemplified cheerfulness when the candidate added a bundle of dry sticks to the council fire that caught immediately and blazed brightly.





This was a remarkable experience that I shared with Chris Steele, Cy Roth, JJ Murray, Shaun McManus, and Ed Lacey. The take home message from Prism that I received was that we, as dedicated scouters and brothers, need to absorb the messages of scouting and the OA and amplify and broadcast them in all aspects of our daily lives. It is our duty

to be prisms in this dark world and convert simple light into a beautiful

mosaic of all the colors of the rainbow. Even though we happened to be in West Virginia during the historic rain and flooding, which put a damper on us experiencing the Summit's numerous activities, this OA event was ironically illuminating and enlightening.

"Fifteen blazes led you to us, but the trail that you have followed becomes rougher, steeper, fainter. You will need a brighter fire."

In years past, I have encouraged you to think about the "Fifteen blazes". I find that it is easy for us to remain focused solely upon the meaning of the blazes. Today, I want us to focus on the "brighter fire".

"At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us."
Albert Schweitzer

It has been 35 years since my Ordeal. Even today, there are countless times when the words of our ceremonies come back to my consciousness to help guide me through circumstances.

I must admit that it is sometimes a real struggle to keep the flame kindled within me. This year, in particular, it seems that I have struggled to keep my spark from dimming. As many of you know, my Father lost his battle to cancer last November. Immediately, the outpouring of love and support from my scouting community was like a balm to my soul. As time passed, however, grief set in and things became more difficult. I would like to share two things that happened this summer that helped fan my flame and kept it from going out.

The day before Father's Day I received a call from Harrison Smith, a 25-year-old Eagle Scout from my troop and Brotherhood member of this Lodge. Because he moved to Florida, it had been quite a while since I had heard from him. He told me he was passing through town and wanted to know if we could meet up. I explained that I had plans for the day, but invited him to come to my Sunday School class in the morning. Surprisingly, he came! We had a great time catching up with stories about the troop, of Philmont, and the Jamboree. I asked him why he did this and he said, "I just had you on my mind and thought we could catch up". I was so uplifted by his visit.

Later this summer I was sitting at home when I received a telephone call from Jon Tom Stevens, Eagle Scout and Vigil Honor member of our Lodge. I knew he was away working at Northern Tier, so the call was unexpected; I thought he might need help with something. At first the conversation was light and chatty. I finally asked him, "So, Jon Tom, why did you call?" It was then that he shared his "deep gratitude" to me for being a friend and mentor. It seems I listened to him for fifteen minutes straight as he gave uplifting and reassuring words. It brought tears to my eyes.

Neither of these young men knew what I was going through, and it never even came up. In my mind they both probably think that I am a stalwart of scouting strength who never stumbles or strays (because that is what all us old windbags want you to think). Neither knew just how needed their words of encouragement would be. These young men are but two examples of Arrowmen who are daily living out the Admonition. Their friendship quickly reminded me how to seek the fire at the center, and the importance of kindling cheerfulness within me. They laid oak and pine around my heart so that a warm and cheerful spirit could be sustained. They showed me the bigger picture.

It was then that the obvious hit me. The brighter fire we need to help get us through the rougher, steeper, and fainter trail is "not about me" – it's about others. Yes, Cheerfulness in our own hearts somewhat helps sustain us through rough times; but we are not just the Cheerful. We are the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service. Bound together with the Admonition, I would argue that it is not our own "brighter fire" that sustains us through hard times, but it is the presence of our brothers who share their brighter fire that is truly sustaining.


